

HALLOWEEN FACTS


Halloween is short for *All Hallow's Eve*. It is the vigil of All Saints (All Hallows) Day. All Saints Day is a Holy Day of Obligation, and thus a major feast on the Catholic Church's liturgical calendar.



Halloween (October 31st) is connected with All Saints Day (November 1st) and All Souls Day (November 2nd). These three days taken together are the "Days of the Dead," a triduum of feasts also called Allhallowtide, Hallowtide, or Hallowmas ('hallow' means to honor as holy).

Halloween is, therefore, the first day of Allhallowtide, the time of year when the living honors all the dead in Christ: all the saints in heaven as well as all the holy souls detained in purgatory on their way to heaven. It is a beautiful celebration of the communion of saints!

Halloween begins the celebration these Christian holy days that remind the faithful of the reality of heaven and hell, the saints and the damned, demons and angels, and the holy souls suffering in purgatory.



Our All Saints Day Program is Sunday, October 28th at 9:40am. All are invited to attend. The program will take place in the church basement; Adoration and Benediction to follow in the church

HOW TO CELEBRATE

Catholics should not neglect the celebration of any of the Church's major feasts, and All Saints Day is no exception. Celebrate the feast by taking the family to Mass on All Hallow's Eve, and pray for the intercession of the saints in heaven—especially those who are your patrons. Read about the lives of the saints, hand out holy cards, have a party with saint-based activities or costumes for kids. On All Saints Day thank the saints for what they have done for you; adorn their altars and images with flowers, venerate their relics, recite special prayers and litanies in their honor. Enjoy a special meal with loved ones.

Then, on All Souls Day, pray for the Holy Souls in Purgatory and make sacrifices on their behalf, especially those whom you have known and loved, and for those who have no one to pray for them. Visit graveyards and cemeteries to pray for the dead who can no longer pray for themselves.

(Continued from last week)

As I had mentioned last week we were going to discuss candles today. The reason I wanted to wait was to be sure there was plenty of space to discuss their meaning and symbolism. Candles are probably my favorite sacramental in the Church and, in my opinion, we don't use nearly enough of them! I had to laugh the summer I was a deacon when we lost power at the church and I could just keep on working because we had more than enough candles to provide the light needed.

The candles on the altar can be arranged in many different ways. They can either be on the altar or on the floor by the altar, and there are used either two, four, or six candles (but more is always allowed!). In the old mass, two candles were used for Low Mass or mass without music, and six candles were used for High Mass or mass with music. Although we do not use the same classifications anymore, the idea still stays the same; the higher the solemnity or celebration, the more we celebrate. A normal weekday mass should look very different from a typical Sunday mass which should look different from an Easter Sunday mass.

Altar candles are required to be white and made of at least 51% beeswax. The reason is that beeswax is seen as the purest form of wax and the white echoes the purity we are called to have in our souls. Going further, the candle actually represents us! This is the reason why I always prefer the candles on the altar, as it is a much fuller symbol. At every mass, we are called to place our lives, our sacrifices throughout the week, on the altar. As we give ourselves over more-and-more to Our Lord, represented by the flame, our lives are consumed by the Love of God just as the candle is consumed.

You will also look around the church and see candles in other places as well. Votive candles are typically burned before the image of a saint in honor of them. Tradition holds that as long as the candle burns, the intention we lit the candle for is being prayed for by that saint. This is why it is a good and holy practice to burn votive candles; to attain the aid of the saints. This practice can and should be done in the home as well! When we burn candles at home, we bring the faith alive all the more in our homes.

One more thing about candles. Whenever a candle is blessed using the old rite, as they are done here at our church, the candle carries with it a special blessing. The prayer asks that the light it gives off not only illuminate the place where it burns, but that it might also dispel the darkness and it's agents from that place. In other words, burning a properly blessed candle in the home will help keep evil spirits away. Combine that with a properly blessed house and sprinkling holy water mixed with blessed salt (available at church) regularly through the house, you and your family will be well protected spiritually.
